AGC Construction Club Named National Outstanding Emerging Chapter

his past March several members of the Missouri State Construction Club had the privilege of attending the Annual Associated General Contractors (AGC) of America Convention at the Bellagio Hotel and Casino in Las Vegas, Nevada. Aside from listening to keynote speakers, hosting an informational booth on chapter activities, and getting to see the beautiful sights that Vegas has to offer, the highlight of the event for the students in attendance was receiving the Outstanding Emerging Student Chapter Award. This national award is presented to only one chapter each year. A panel of industry practitioners evaluate application packets for the previous calendar year based upon demonstration of skill, responsibility, and integrity the three tenants of the AGC of America.

This was the first time for the MSU chapter to be recognized on a national level for its ongoing educational and service activities. Some of the items that caught the judge's attention during the award evaluation process included multiple outreach projects. These efforts were focused on both traditional community service projects (i.e., Adopt-A-Street, SCA Chicken BBQ, and Generation Next Bass Bash) and workforce development/education activities. The latter category was paramount to the club's recognition for the Outstanding Emerging Student Chapter Award. Of note was the success of reaching out to school-age children. The construction club's partnership with the Home Builder Association of Greater Springfield for the "Be Constructive" program at Holland Elementary and the Build My Future event at the Ozark Empire Fairground were both aimed at showing youth how exciting and lucrative careers in construction can be. The Holland Elementary program focused on fun games and activities like plan reading with pretzels and marshmallows, popsicle stick bridge building, and ceramic tile coasters. Build My Future is geared towards regional high schools and includes a plethora of hand-on activities from virtual welding, equipment operation, and even the Construction Club's PVC bridge building set-up.

In addition to the community service, the club's efforts to partner with its AGC sponsor, the Builders Association of Kansas City, and other industry companies were instrumental in receiving the award. Educational programming like monthly industry speakers, out-of-town field trips, and educational workshops will also continue to be an important aspect for the club.



Going Virtual

In March, Missouri State University joined the rest of the world when the decision was announced to shutdown campus. It was the start of Spring Break and students and faculty were told that the much anticipated and needed break from classes would be extended a week as the campus community would begin to prepare for online course delivery.


Like the construction industry itself, MSU was committed to figuring out ways to ensure higher education activities would continue in a safe manner. Faculty began recording lectures for students to watch independently; Zoom would become a de facto part of the "college experience".

Alumni Spotlight: Travis Gillespie

ravis Gillespie graduated with his B.S. in Construction Management in May 2014. He currently works for the Gillespie Excavating Company LLC in Springfield, MO. As a small family-owned business, Travis wears many hats including that of a project manager, heavy equipment operator, and estimator. Although he wasn't officially working there until he graduated in 2014, he's been part of the company's operations since he was tall enough to "reach the pedals".

When asked to describe an average day, he says "average" is a poor way to describe any day in his line of work. The only thing common from day to day is what time the alarm goes off in the morning, and even that varies. If it's a sunny, dry day you can most likely find him in the field managing work and operating equipment. If it rains, you'll probably find him in the office estimating new work, building machine control files for their automated earth moving equipment, or in the shop making repairs. Here are some snippets from our interview with Travis.

What project(s) have you been working on?

We are currently spread out over the Springfield area and surrounding communities. A few of our current projects include a relatively large subdivision and apartment facility in Rogersville, MO, a new golf driving range in Springfield, MO, a handful of Dollar Generals, a large storm water improvement project at a local community college, multiple land clearing operations, and my favorite being our mobile crushing plant which allows us to recycle all types of masonry, asphalt, and concrete products into usable materials which we then use on our own job sites.

What are some of the most valuable things you've learned on the job?

I would say the most important skill I have not so much learned in the field but rather improved upon is my ability



to think abstractly, or outside the box. There are an infinite number of challenges that can arise in a workday; none of them are planned, and being able to look at the many resources at your disposal and determine the best way to move forward is certainly a skill that gets tested in this business.


What have been some keys to your success since leaving Missouri State?

The biggest key to my success since leaving MSU would have to be my determination to grow and diversify our business. A company must be able to do what they do well, and ready to do something else well when that quits working. The second key is learning to communicate with the many walks of life that make up this industry from the engineers to the PMs, to the boys who have more fingers than teeth, but stronger backs and shorter fuses.

What's the best advice you've been given?

The best advice I have been given, there are some funny answers to this like, "don't hold that jumping jack under your chin" or "never drive a tracked machine squarely over a berm". Thankfully, I only learned one of those the hard way, but seriously the best advice I have ever received

has not been verbally but rather in the relentless and unmatched work ethic of both my parents who have taught me character, communication, compassion, courtesy, and all of the other life skills a person needs to possess by their example.


Sigma Lambda Chi




What has been your favorite part about being in this program and how has it helped you reach your goals?



ASC Region 4 Student Competition

uring October, Missouri State University students from both the construction management and interior programs competed in four of the five divisions of the 2020 Region 4 Associated Schools of Construction (ASC) virtual student competition. This was a change from previous years due to the limitations in place because of COVID-19. Over the course of five days students were asked to prepare estimates and execution plans at their home campuses. A panel of judges from industry reviewed and graded the team's proposals that included the plans for managing and constructing each project.

Students were asked to prepare and present their proposed ideas to a panel of judges via a virtual presentation at the end of the competition period. The unique situations created by a virtual competition allowed students to see first-hand how the construction industry has been forced to adjust to the limitations associated with the pandemic.

Missouri State's heavy/civil team placed first in their division. The project was to remove and replace of 0.8 miles of roadway in West Memphis that crossed both I-40 & I-55 just west of the Mississippi River. One of the challenges of this year's competition was the utilization of an "A + C" contracting method. The MSU students estimated just over \$14M in total costs (actual project cost was just under \$15M) and a duration of 210 days.

The commercial new construction team placed second against other schools in the region. The project consisted of a new 10,000 sq. ft. fire station in Olathe, KS. This two-story structure was estimated to have a \$5M overall project budget and included a small public area, three new fire apparatus bays, fire station administration offices, a break room, locker rooms, bunk rooms, and an exercise area.

Finally, the design-build team placed second in their division as well. The project was a new 21,000 sq. ft. middle school in California. The proposal included a multi-phase site master plan showing future football and baseball fields, new parking for 300 cars, and the new two story school building. The guaranteed maximum price proposal was not to exceed \$16M dollars for the first phase of construction with a total project duration including design and construction of 26 months.






Stacie Ramos, Students Committee Chair


